#### Foreword: About DraftVerify

DraftVerify was founded to bring scientific integrity and operational consistency to the fast-growing world of non-alcoholic draft service.

As the category expands, the potential for cross-contact, misidentification, and system confusion increases—especially in venues that serve both alcoholic and non-alcoholic products from shared infrastructure.

The **DraftVerify Standard** provides the industry's first unified benchmark for how non-alcoholic draft systems should be identified, maintained, and verified.

This framework is not a service program—it is a **rulebook** for responsible operators, distributors, and manufacturers who believe that quality, safety, and transparency must extend to every pour.

## 1. Purpose

The DraftVerify Standard defines the baseline operational and identification requirements ensuring that beverages represented as non-alcoholic are dispensed via draft systems free of contamination, cross-contact, or misrepresentation.

## 2. Scope

- Applies to storage, handling, identification, and dispensing of non-alcoholic products through draft systems.
- Relevant to venues, distributors, and installers operating mixed or dedicated systems.
- Excludes brewing, production, and formulation processes.

#### 3. Definitions

- Non-Alcoholic (NA): Beverage ≤ 0.5% ABV or local equivalent threshold.
- **Cross-Contact:** Introduction of ethanol-bearing liquid or vapor into NA draft pathways due to shared equipment, fittings, or procedures.
- **Verification:** Assessment of system conformance to this standard.
- **Serialized Tag:** A unique identifier affixed to a compliant system for traceability (e.g., DV-SITE-YYYY-#####).

### 4. Core Principles

- 1. **Separation** NA dispensing pathways must be isolated from alcoholic pathways.
- 2. **Identification** NA components must be visibly and permanently distinguished.
- 3. **Verification** Conformance must be provable through a documented record.
- 4. **Education** Personnel must understand and maintain NA handling integrity.

### 5. System Identification Requirements

- **Distinct Identification:** Operators must use visible, durable identification methods for NA components (no specific colors or fittings mandated).
- **Permanent Labeling:** A serialized DraftVerify tag is affixed at the NA coupler or connection point.
- **Segregation Assurance:** Operators maintain written procedures preventing NA and alcoholic line crossover during use or maintenance.

### 6. Physical Separation & Cross-Contact Prevention

- NA lines must not be reused for alcoholic products without re-verification.
- Gas supply must prevent backflow or line migration that introduces alcohol.
- Cleaning must avoid chemical or fluid crossover from alcoholic lines.
- Shared towers or manifolds require documented physical or procedural controls.

# 7. Handling & Storage (Cold Chain)

- Store NA kegs ≤ 4 °C where feasible.
- Tapped kegs should be consumed within a defined time window (1-2 week).
- Prevent contact with ethanol residues during transport, cleaning, or rinsing.

#### 8. Verification Protocol

DraftVerify verification occurs at three intervals:

- Initial Verification: Tag issued, documentation captured, and controls validated.
- Annual Renewal: Reassessment of identification, handling, and records.
- Post-Modification Review: Required after any system change affecting NA integrity.

## 9. Field Testing (Optional but Recommended)

Operators may conduct optional ethanol screening:

- Rinse-through sampling for ethanol detection pre- and post-maintenance.
- Approved enzymatic or spectrometric detection methods ("not detected" required).
- Surface ATP or hygiene testing as a supplementary cleanliness measure.

### 10. Documentation & Recordkeeping

- Verification Record: Venue, verifier, tag serial, date, and findings.
- Identification Plan: Description of how NA components are distinguished.
- Change Log: All hardware or gas configuration adjustments.
- Cleaning Log: Frequency, agents, and responsible staff.

## 11. Tag Serialization & Registry

- Every verified NA connection point receives a serialized tag (DV-SITE-YYYY-#####).
- Tag data stored in DraftVerify registry with operator details.
- Public verification via QR or URL encouraged; private data remains confidential.

## 12. Roles & Responsibilities

- Operator: Implements and maintains identification and segregation controls.
- Distributor/Installer: Supports operator compliance and safe handling.
- Verifier: Confirms conformance and maintains audit trail for certification.

# 13. Conformance Assessment & Scoring

- Major Non-Conformity (NC): Active risk of cross-contact or absent identification.
- **Minor NC:** Documentation or labeling issues without direct contamination risk. Certification requires zero Major NCs and closure of any Minor NCs within 30 days.

#### 14. Use of Mark

- Only verified systems may display the "DraftVerify Certified" mark.
- The mark indicates compliance, not product endorsement.
- Misuse may result in revocation and public notice in the registry.

## 15. Incident Response & Corrective Action

- Immediately isolate suspected contaminated lines.
- Document cause, corrective steps, and results of verification retest.
- Certification suspended until re-verification confirms compliance.

# 16. Change Management

- Planned system changes require segregation review before service.
- Unplanned changes must be logged within 24 hours and verified ASAP.

### 17. Events & Mobile Service Conditions

- Temporary setups must meet permanent system identification standards.
- Portable systems (jockey boxes, manifolds) must be dedicated or re-verified.
- Post-event teardown includes cleaning verification and re-tagging if needed.
